

THE CAPRICORNIA CRUISING YACHT CLUB - THE FIRST 25 YEARS.

This booklet covering the first twenty-five years of the C.C.Y.C, has been compiled by present Secretary, Deirdre Parker.

IN THE BEGINNING

No one knows when the Darambal aboriginal people first occupied the Keppel Bay area but it must have been at least 30 thousand years ago. But we do know, that on Friday the 25th of May 1770 at 4pm, Captain James Cook and his crew dropped the "Endeavor's" anchor in 12 fathoms in Keppel Bay "having the mainland and islands in a manner all around us", and were the first white men to see the beautiful waters of this bay.

Cook named the islands and the bay after Augustus Keppel, a Royal Navy officer who became Admiral Keppel and 1st Lord of the Admiralty. He mapped the area before leaving on the 27th of May to continue north on his epic journey.

Quoting from Cook's Journal: Sunday the 27th of May, on leaving Keppel Bay:

"At noon we were about two leagues from the mainland on Lat.22.53'Long. made from Cape Capricorn 0 20'West At this time the northern most point I named Cape Many Fold Keppel Islands from the number of high hills over it. Lat. 22 43'S it lies N.26 west distance 17 leagues from Cape Capricorn.

Between them and the shore forms a large bay, which I have Hummocky Is. called Keppel Bay and the islands which lie in and off it were known by the same name.

Sape Capricorn

In this bay is good anchorage where there is sufficient depths of water. What refreshments it may afford for shipping I know not. We caught no fish here not withstanding we were at anchor.

It can hardly be doubted but what it affords is fresh water in several places, as both main land and islands are inhabited we saw smokes by day and fires in the night upon the main and upon one of the islands."

Some 32 years later at 10am on the 9th of August, 1802, Lieutenant Matthew Flinders in the "Investigator" accompanied by the "Lady Nelson", further surveyed the bay on a greater scale before leaving at 2:30 in the afternoon of the 19th August 1802 to continue his circumnavigation of Australia.

Since that time, geographically, Keppel Bay has seen little change and remains today, protected by the Keppel Islands, one of the most scenic and ideal areas for aquatic activities on the east coast of Australia.

Soon the early pioneers found the area an ideal site to live and settlement along the Keppel Bay shores started late in the 1860 and spread along the whole of the immediate coast. As time passed it became apparent that the picturesque bay was an ideal place for all boating activities, so many seafaring folk made good use of the area for commercial and sporting activities on the water.

As time went by and the population of the

area grew, there was a greater need for a facility, which would serve the commercial and pleasure craft both large and small to access the Keppel Bay area. Complaints and requests to this end stimulated the then Government to consider and choose an area to develop a harbour for these needs.

Until this time larger craft were kept at Port Alma, anchored in the Fitzroy River at Rockhampton, Ross Creek Yeppoon or at Fisherman's Beach Emu Park. The fishing fleet was forced to take their catch to and operate out of Gladstone, as the facilities at Yeppoon eventually did not reach the set standards.

The State Government realized that the Keppel Bay coast lacked a suitable anchorage for such craft and this harbour consideration would give easy access to the nearby islands which were becoming an increasingly popular tourist and recreational area.

On the 20th of February 1965 the engineering firm of Blain, Bremner and Williams submitted their recommendations laid out by their chief consulting engineer Mr. Bill Bremner, (a yachtsman himself) and the site for the new harbour was chosen. The sight picked was situated between Double Heads and Rosslyn Head Yeppoon and named Rosslyn Bay, probably so named after one of the descendants of the Ross family, the first pioneers in the area. This was an anchorage used in bad weather from the south east, by all craft at that time.

So it was announced and tenders were called for the first stage of a Harbour development at Double Heads in September 1967. This would be built at a cost of \$400,000.00 on a stage-by-stage basis and when

completed would be expected to provide small craft and fishing boats with a safe harbour available at all states of the tide

In April 1973 the Harbour was officially opened by the Honorable the Minister for Conservation and Aboriginal Affairs, Mr. Neville Hewitt and in 1974 the breakwater was extended and dredging of the

basin carried out.

In 1976 Cyclone David caused major damage, the breakwater was over topped and the pontoon and jetties demolished. The engineers carried out exhaustive analysis and the breakwater was redesigned. The new design is today regarded internationally as a major breakthrough in rubble mound breakwaters

and has been designed to withstand a seastate with a design return interval of 1 in 100 years.

In 1987 approval was given for construction of a marina at Rosslyn Bay. The proposed project included the building of a 1000-meter breakwater from Statue Point to the Harbour entrance, dredging for the marina and reclamation of 12 hectares on the northern breakwater was commenced in March 1989 and completed the following year. This breakwater gave further protection to the

This breakwater gave further protection to the bay and its occupants.

This bay and portion of its reclaimed land around its southeastern shore, was in the future to become the home of the C.C.Y.C.

THE BIRTH OF A CLUB

Necessity they say is the birth of invention and formation and so it was with the C.C.Y.C. Tom Susans the Commodore of the F.M.B.C. in 1974 and foundation member of the C.C.Y.C. tells of the events leading to the formation of the C.C.Y.C.

As the numbers of yachts, both keelers and trailable yachts began to increase in the Rockhampton area it became obvious to a number of us that the existing F.M.B.C. would not be able to cater effectively for both the power boats and sailing yachts.

As Rosslyn Bay harbour development was also becoming a reality the siting of a yacht club in that area was becoming desirable. The F.M.B.C. had already made approaches to ensure that in the planning stages of Rosslyn Bay, land would be available for amateur boating but as the F.M.B.C. had recently renovated it's Quay Street premises, they were in no position to develop another club.

The F.M.B.C. members, though were interested in another club eventually developing a Rosslyn Bay site and it was noted that the K.B.S.C.at the coast, was unable, at that time, to establish a coastal facility for larger yachts.

It was with the above factors in mind that a number of us discussed the possibility of forming a cruising yacht club to cater for sailing craft with overnight accommodation. This idea had been under discussion for some time and after talking with Harry Parker (leading advocate for a new club), we decided to bring matters to a head by calling a meeting of those interested in the formation of a Yacht Club.


Therefore we went across the road to the Bulletin office from the old Fitzroy Motor Boat Club and placed an advertisement in the newspaper calling a meeting to be held at my home, 69 Seigel Street North Rockhampton in May 1974.

The idea of a meeting at a private house was to ensure that any new club could not be confused with being an extension of an existing club and would therefore be autonomous from it's inception. Thirteen interested people attended the meeting, where it was decided that a new cruising yacht club should be formed. A steering committee consisting of Dr Frank Champion, Major Jack Crigan, Mr. Peter Gardner, Mr. Arthur Dagan and myself with Mr. Ian Renton as spokesperson was formed to organize the formalities.

So the first General meeting was called by advertisement in the Morning Bulletin and was held on the 9th of June 1974, in Dr Frank Champion's office in Bolsover Street, Rockhampton (the building has now been demolished and replaced).

At this meeting the following Flag Officers and various Committees members were elected. The proposed Constitution was tabled by the Chairman Harry Parker and adopted. Fees were set and the new Club flag designed by Harry Parker and others was discussed. This was to incorporate the black and gold colours with the Capricorn goat emblem surrounded by the sun, which would have a black body and gold fly carrying the C.C.Y.C. letters in black. This was also adopted and the new Club became a reality.

The fees set joining \$10, Ordinary member \$10, Associate Member \$5 and junior member \$5.

It was some time later that arrangements were made with the F.M.B.C. for the new Capricornia Cruising Yacht Club to meet in their premises and for the C.C.Y.C. to have the use of an area in the Clubs room for Notice Board etc,. The equivalent of a social membership for its members was also made available. This ensured that the C.C.Y.C. had a stable meeting place and the F.M.B.C. Happy Hours Friday nights brought both Clubs together on a social plain as well as providing the members of the new Club with the opportunity for regular informal meetings.

The arrangement was in no way a one sided affair as the F.M.B.C. also profited by increased membership as most owners of keel boats then became members of both Clubs in order to use the F.M.B.C. slipping and pontoon facilities.

I honestly believe that the support of the older Club helped tide the C.C.Y.C. over it's young formative years and helped support it until it was able to secure it's own home (premises).

As an ex guarantor of the FMBC I was also pleased with the arrangements, as I believe the extra interest and membership enabled the FMBC to prosper much more quickly that would have been otherwise possible.

ing both cruising and racing in Central Queens-land and the club's regis-ter would be open to yachts with overnight accommo-dation, including keelers dation, including multi-hulls and

mutti-hulls and trailer-saliers.

It was stated at the meeting that already there were more than 30 boats in the region eligible to participate in events to be conducted by the cino.

conducted by the ciuo, such as one-day and over-night races and cruises in Keppel Bay.

The club hoped eventu-ally to establish, in associ-tion with other sailing and boating clubs, a facility at the Rosslyn Bay Boat Har-hour.

Soon after on the 8th of July 1974, a letter was circulated to all interested persons to attend the second General Meeting on the 17th of July at the premises of the F.M.B.C. at 8pm. This letter stated, people joining the Club before 30th of September 1974, would be classified as foundation Members.

The following were consequently deemed as Foundation Members and Bill Bremner accepted the position of Club Patron, and remained so till his retirement to Brisbane in 1987.

It is hoped that I have the pleasure of meeting you personally on the $17 \mathrm{th}$ of July.

Unimproved CCYC lease – Rosslyn Bay

As previously mentioned the C.C.Y.C. met regularly in Rockhampton at the F.M.B.C. The Club being keenly interested in the development of Rosslyn Bay Harbour at Yeppoon as a

proposed site for the Club in the future. So at the Meeting held on 25/9/1974 the then Secretary Murray Smith, was instructed to write to the Livingstone Shire Council and formally make application for a block of land to be used as a Club facility on the Coast.

The following years saw development stages at Rosslyn Bay. Not until 1976 did three delegates from the C.C.Y.C. (D.Hower, D. Hanley and G.Keane) meet with the then Minister for the Department of Harbours and Marine Mr. Newbury on the occasion of his visit to Rosslyn Bay, to inspect the devastation caused by Cyclone David. From this the Club was informed that the site at the bay would be completed by Christmas 1976.

On the 7/7/1976 the Club made a further approach to the Department and a development program was drawn up by the Executive to look at the cost and requirements needed by the Club to development the site, if and when acquired.

The following two years saw much planning by the Club's Executive and at the General meeting held on the 25/5/78 (with 28 members present) the Commodore Harry Parker tabled the recently acquired plans, maps and charts for the proposed Rosslyn Bay site.

It was anticipated at that time that the Annual rental would be 3% which would approximately be \$1,200 PA. Other estimates were Water connection \$1,500, Electricity connection \$10,000 and security fence \$2,000. Total capital outlay was estimated \$45,000.

After full discussion on this proposal Des Stanaway moved a motion that the C.C.Y.C. now negotiate with the Livingstone Shire Council for a broad term lease at Rosslyn Bay.

This was seconded by Tom Susan and carried unanimously.

So negotiations continued with the Livingstone Council for a further 12 months and at the Special General meeting on the 8/5/79 held at the F.M.B.C. the Lease was presented and accepted by all the Members present. Cost of this Lease was \$2,184.14 and the lease was finally signed in July 1979.

Now development could commence on the unfenced site. The surveying was attended to by Past Commodore Rod Schlencker, with the first construction on our land being a BBQ, built at the waterfront side of the block by Dennis Hanley, Barry Laundry, Don Fuller, Bruce Davidson, Harry & David Parker.

This was put to good use forthwith.

The fence was soon to follow to secure the area.

'Gentlemen it gives me great pleasure to report on the activities of your club for the 1978/79 season. This is our 5th year and perhaps one of the most significant years in the history of the Club, with the granting of the lease at Rosslyn Bay. This lease has now been prepared and signed by your trustees and is in the hands of the Livingstone Shire Council.

With the approval of the Council, work has begun on the site with part erection of the fencing and the laying of the water main and electricity to the clubhouse area, and the property.

With this facility now a reality, I feel the progress of the Club is assured.'

OUT ON THE OCEAN 09/74 TO 09/79

Up until the formation of the C.C.Y.C. new members, to be, had been cruising and racing in sailing events with the FMBC, KBSC and PCSC. One such event was the *Inaugural* "Gladstone to Keppel Island" Ocean Yacht Race. This was held over the weekend of 14/6/74. CCYC Commodore Harry Parker

Crew: Harry Parker, Frank Champion and Ian Renton sailed his yacht "Scintilla" with crew consisting of, (Vice Commodore to be) Frank Champion and (foundation member) Ian Renton. Accompanied by (foundation member) Peter Sleeman in his yacht "Target", they sailed to Gladstone to compete in the race. This was the event which was the lead up to many more such ocean yacht races to be held by the CCYC in the future years.

The first sailing event held by the new Club was on the 4/8/74 and it was decided by the Sailing Committee (consisting of Geoff Farr, Laurie Cook, John Leyden and Vice Commodore Frank Champion), that the cruise would be a *Handicap Log Race* to North Keppel Island. A social gathering and lunch would be held on the island immediately after the race.



The race started at 9.30am after a briefing held outside the Rosslyn Bay Kiosk where skippers received sailing instructions and estimated cruise times.

The event was won by David Howe/Don Fullers yacht "*Tiki 11*," an RL 24. This yacht and her crew was to dominate early events with the CCYC on Keppel Bay.

These formative years included many day and overnight cruises to the beautiful Keppel

Islands. They proved to be immensely popular with the cruising folk as well as the racing fleet. Families were involved and this paved the way for Club unity and enjoyment and these cruises were to be included in the Clubs yearly Calendar of events then and in the years to come.

The following cruise event to the islands in

September 74 was cancelled owing to adverse weather but two hardy mariners actually completing the cruise. They were later overheard mumbling about cowardly T.S.16 skippers. The rest of the club (i.e. cowardly T.S. owners) had an enjoyable sail above the Barrage up the Fitzroy River to the 18-Mile Island and back.

On October 12/13th., saw the first Trophy Event with a predetermined course on Saturday & Sunday with overnight stop at the Island. Winners were as follows.



The first of these races was held on 10/11/74. Yachts were competing for the Cheetham Trophy with the briefing being held at the F.M.B.C on Friday night the 8th. The race started at 11am from Rosslyn Bay.

'This event attracted twelve starters all of whom enjoyed the race despite the light variable winds. Line honours went to 'Tiki 11" David Hower closely followed by 'Sombrero' Tony Loscher and third, John Rudd's Highway 21. The Trophy however, is presented to the winner on corrected time and the Club extends its congratulations to Ian Renton who sailed a magnificent race in his yacht 'Glimmer' Hartley 16'.

And so to 1975.

Due to bad weather conditions in the early months of 1975, many events were cancelled and postponed.

The Inaugural *Commodore's Cup* was run on 6/4/75 being a non-stop race via Myall Island and return. Line Honours to '*Etude*' John Bubb

At this time Arthur Dagan (the Club measurer

and handicapper) and Lindsay Dagan had purchased a 30' Diamond "class sloop 'Spitfire V11' and sailed her from Brisbane in record time, it was told. Brother's Earl and Ron were soon to join the Club. With acquisition of this yacht.. 'Spitfire VII' soon showed her stern to many of the Club vachts in the competitive racing. 30ft yacht and by 2

that the Inaugural 'Yeppoon to Mackay_''Ocean Yacht Race would be staged by the CCYC (in conjunction with the newly formed Cruising Yacht Club Mackay) on the long week end of 3rd, 4th, 5th of May 1975.

The patron Bill Bremner had donated the major Trophy and wall plaque and preparations were put in place to run this yachting event.

And so planning started. A delegation of 6 members of the Committee visited the Cruising Yacht Club of Mackay and found that the Club was keenly interested in the race and would co-operate closely with the CCYC. Apart from the business side of the weekend, the delegation gained a fair amount of local knowledge.

For instance, Bruce Davidson made the amazing discovery that there are a lot of lights around the harbour at 3 o'clock in the morning. (Invaluable information for yacht navigators.!) At one am., Bruce together with Ian Renton had clinched a deal to purchase a 30ft yacht and by 2.30am, had sailed a Trans-

Pacific voyage. However by 7.30am they had written the whole experience off as a nightmare.

Arthur Dagan, Harry Parker, Frank Champion and Murray Smith (the Secretary & Editor) conducted themselves in a manner befitting CCYC Committeemen.

(Membership now stands at 51. Our statistician tells us that, of those members, 10.91% are female, 7.27% are medicos, 1.82% are wowsers, 1.82% are Americans and 5.45% are Dagans)

The Sailing Committee had been investigating the proposal put forward by Commodore Harry Parker and others that the Club looks at holding a major ocean yacht race. So on the 1st of February it was announced

The following was published in the magazine OFFSHORE in June 1975 - This tells all.

The First Yeppoon to Mackay Ocean Yacht Race Unlucky 13 Haunts Race.

The Inaugural Yeppoon to Mackay Ocean Yacht Race turned into a battle of the big ones in many respects. Firstly there was a battle for line honours over the 180 miles to Mackay between the two big boats, a 43ft Sydney sloop, *Williwilli*, skippered by John Hawley from the Middle Harbour Yacht Club, who defeated by 60seconds the 53ft Mackay ketch, *Heemskerk*, skippered by John Donkin. It was a battle of the big waves, over 20ft high, whipped by big winds from 30 to 45 knots. The race was conducted by the Capricornia Cruising Yacht Club which was formed just 9 months ago. It started on Saturday, 3rd May from the Central Queensland coastal resort of Yeppoon just north of the Tropic of Capricorn.

The course followed the scenic coast for five miles passing many excellent vantage points, which were packed with spectators. Yachts then were to proceed north to round High Peak Island lighthouse on the main northern shipping channel, then to Vernon Rocks Lighthouse, and to Mackay with the finish line between the beacons at the entrance to Mackay Harbour.

Fourteen entrants were received; however, strong southeasterly winds for two weeks before the race prevented the Mackay trimaran, *Valauranne*, from reaching Yeppoon in time for the start. Thirteen started, and it may be argued for years that this was an unlucky number that caused organizers and families many hours of worry and concern during the weekend. The method used to start the inaugural Yeppoon to Mackay Race is believed to be a first in Australian Yachting. The start was 25 miles inland in the studios of 4RO, Rockhampton Commercial broadcasting studio. All yachts had transistor radios tuned to 4RO for a 15 minutes countdown and simultaneously when the starter gave the "go" tone, the Yeppoon Coastguard fired a white parachute flare from one of the launches marking the starting line.

A strong wind warning was current when the fleet crossed the line and spinnakers were broken out in the 30-knot southeasterly winds. Trouble struck the fleet as they headed out of the protection of the Keppel Island group, and two of the smaller yachts, the 24ft sloop *Tiki 11*, and the 23ft sloop *Sombrero*, were dismasted when hit by a strong wind squall.

Larger yachts soon left behind the baby of the fleet, the 19ft *Caprice*, and in the rough conditions decided to retire from the race and return to the protection of the Rosslyn Bay Harbour. The remainder of the fleet reported a wild and exhilarating run up the coast with *Williwilli* reaching 22knots down the face of the high seas. Even the 30 footers were reaching speeds of 15 knots.

The 30ft Rockhampton sloop Spitfire V11 held a narrow lead on Williwilli and Heemskerk late on Saturday afternoon when she dived through the top of a high wave and dropped into a deep trough bending her rudder level with the bottom of the boat, forcing her retirement. On the 4pm radio sked, most skippers learned with alarm that the High Peak Island Lighthouse was not working, and with the dark night and rain squalls the island, which was the major rounding mark in the course, would be impossible to see.

The sloop *Scintilla*, skippered by Capricornia Cruising Yacht Club Commodore Harry Parker, was running close inshore and was caught in a 40-knot rain and wind squall, which cut visibility to zero. Her crew decided to retire to the protection of Island Head Creek

as they had no chance of obtaining a position fix with the lighthouse not operating. Yachts that were further to seaward, set courses to give the island a wide berth.

The failure of this lighthouse caused the crews much concern and confusion during the wild night at sea and was undoubtedly the reason for the 32ft Mackay sloop Solitaire hitting Denton Reef at 3.30am on Sunday morning. Her crew spent the night on the side of the yacht and at daybreak launched their liferaft in which they spent two days waiting for rescue.

Unfortunately *Solitaire's* mast had exploded on impact with the reef, and they were unable

to get a radio message of their plight to either the *Ampol* Mother Vessel *Seeker*, or the Yeppoon and Mackay Coastguard who were keeping a 24 hour radio watch on the fleet. A search aircraft found *Solitaire* on Monday afternoon and diverted the Barrier Reef Tourist Cruiser *Coralita* to the reef at first light on Tuesday.

The rescue operation was first class and the crew were plucked from the sea by the *Coralita*, transferred to a seaplane and returned to Mackay. *Solitaire* was a write-off. However, the rescue of the crew was a brilliant example of co-ordination among *Coralita*, R.A.A.F., Mackay Air Sea Rescue, D.C.A. Mackay Hospital and Doctors, Happy Bay Resort and many more people. Throughout Saturday night the battle of the giants continued and as day dawned, *Williwilli* was approaching Mackay Harbour closely followed by *Heemskerk*. *Williwilli* crossed the line at 6.09am to establish a record for the course of 19hrs and 54 minutes, a

record, which could stand for many years. Heemskerk finished 1 minute later. No other yachts crossed the finishing line until 4.30pm when the 40ft ketch Silhouette skippered by Dave Morine representing the Ponsonby Yacht Club of New Zealand, finished.

> She was followed by the 24ft sloop Al-Cyone, skippered by Ernie Skinnerton from the Port Curtis Sailing Club. Gladstone and Gilden. skippered by Peter Rule, which is a 19'6" Red Witch sloop from Mackay. The crews of Al-Cyone and Gilden sailed a great race in very heavy conditions with Gilden covering the last 120 miles under storm jib. The next vacht to finish was the 22ft Mackay Bluebird sloop Teal, skippered by Wal Sheperd, which light aircraft searched for during Sunday. Teal took a course well clear of Vernon Rocks, approaching Mackay from a more northerly direction and sailed most of

the course under a well-reefed

mainsail and storm jib.

The last yacht to cross the line was *Cottontail*, skippered by David Newman from Gladstone, which finished at midnight Sunday having sailed well to sea during the wild Saturday night.

When the handicaps were adjusted, *Williwilli* won the Bremner Trophy by 26minutes from *Heemskerk* with *Al-Cyone* taking third place. Once in Mackay the crews of all yachts were welcomed into homes of Mackay citizens and all have declared they will be in it again next year.

The race has attracted Australia-wide attention and covers some of the most interesting waters on the tropical coast. Next year's race follows the Brisbane to Gladstone race by about 2 weeks and many of the competitors in this event are expected to take part in the Yeppoon to Mackay event.

Story supplied by foundation Executive Committee Member, Ian Renton (The then Manager of Radio 4R0 Rockhampton.) Following on from Mackay race *Spitfire V11* now with new rudder, competed in the 2nd PCSC 'Gladstone to Keppel Island' race on the 13/6/75 winning this in record time and taking line honours. This effort also gained Arthur the 4RO Sportsman of the Week award.

Spitfire V11 went on to win the Yeppoon to Mackay Race - 3 years running.

CLUB PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT:

By 8/11/79 the land site had been fenced and secured, electricity and water connected and quotes were obtained for construction of an amenities block from G.R.Cook and Associates, building Contractors. The concrete slab for the roof was to come after the opening.

Outers were First Clubhouse - 1982

Quotes were accepted and, with the help of many members at working bees, the official opening of the Club house(as such) was carried out on the 21/06/80 by Mr. Henry Beak, the then Chairman of the Livingstone Shire Council.

was acquired on the 26/3/80 and the Ladies Auxiliary Group formed 14/3/80. Cheryl Schlencker took the Chair, with Secretary Joan Purdie and Treasurer Deirdre Parker.

During the 7th month of 1980 the Livingstone Shire Council handed over control of the Harbour to Harbours Corporation for the Government and the CCYC lease was transferred to this Department on the 22/07/80.

As members were having to use the Public ramp to launch their boats it was proposed by Commodore Parker at the meeting on the



22/7/80 that the Club look at constructing it's own Ramp, Hard Stand and Pontoon. Much planning was needed for this large

Working bee, building first ramp. this large construction and after consideration Don

Fuller's quote was accepted and 1982 saw the completion of the Ramp and handstand. A large number of club members were involved. The underwater lease for the ramp was secured on the 01/02/82.

The pontoon plans were put on hold owing to the cost at this time.

During these years the following noted items were acquired by the Club: On the racing scene, the 1st Club boat "Sea Witch" arrived, three race buoys and new race flags and radio equipment installed and an AYF Training scheme was set in place by Ian Whelan. The first beer fridge was donated to the Club

by the F.M.B.C. With a booth License in place, this allowed members legally, to enjoy a cold and favored tinny. The phone lines were connected. The Constitution booklets were updated and Incorporation proceedings were started with the Club solicitors.


Times were changing

and the Executive Committee could see that the Club would need more land in the very near future. This was owing to the steady growth in members (membership stood at 283 with 125 boats in July of 1983) and the need for dry land storage for members, especially those living in western towns of Central Queensland.

Application was made to acquire the block of land to the east of the Club lease but this was not to be as it was allocated to the Tourist group at the time.

So the Club turned their eyes to the west and as the Mecka Lease had not been taken up as proposed, an application was made on 19/06/1983 to secure this additional land.

Much negotiation followed with the Department and at the General meeting on the 21/09/83 John Learmonth moved a motion that the Club accept the offer of the Mecka Lease from the Dept. of Harbours & Marine. Formal approval was received and the area east of the Clubhouse land was to be vacated by 31/12/83 with rent for the new area to be charged accordingly from 01/01/84.

The Inaugural 'Summer Series' was the next Series formed by the Sailing Committee. This was a four-race event held over the early summer months. The first Heat was a buoy race held on the 11/11/79 and at the final heat on the 15/12/79 saw 'Taurus' skippered by Barry Laundry, win from 'Allegro' (Alan Croft) second and 'Cowboy' (Bruce Purdie), third.

A fun race 'Around Keppel Island' was again held at Keppel Island on New Years Day and featured a sprint from the bar at the Resort [after a cool drink, for the skippers,] to their yachts and then a race around the island. 'Papillon" (Kevin Hanley) won, closely followed by the Parker's in 'Scintilla' second, Shane Burke in 'Te Anau' third, Andrew Watt in 'Tylo' fourth and Ian Whelan fifth in 'Waarlock'. A fun Beach Bar B Q, put on by the Resort, followed.

Here is an extract from Jan. *Dogwatch* 1980, on this event:

"Several people think Waarlock won the race, however, protests are still being heard over which skippers didn't scull their starting beer properly, who used motors! and even one of the boats starting with all sails up while being held by its crew. This must be one of the most grueling race starts in the Southern Hemisphere since each year – a number of skippers are barely able to climb aboard their craft after the chug-a-lug, beach sprint and swim to their boats."

The Chippendale "River Race" in March 1980 saw 'Timandra' Bruce Davidson's yacht take line honours from the fleet of 21 craft.

For the first time, in May 1980, the "Yeppoon to Mackay" Race sailed with two divisions. In this year Harry Parker sailed 'Scintilla' to a win in the Cruising Division,

second was Vince

O'Brien in 'Geodesy' and third Andrew Wake in 'Half Moon''.

The racing Division saw 'Amelia' (Graham Birch) first, 'Taurus' (Barry Laundry) second and 'Rainbow Connection' (Peter Rule, from Mackay), third.

The Great River Race was now sponsored by Blue Water Marine and remained so for years.

In April 1981 many of the Club trailer sailer yachts trailed south to attend the Inaugural "Tin Can Bay /Harvey Bay" Yacht Race. This was to become a very popular annual event for the trailer sailer yachts in the Club.

The race saw 27 yachts nominate but the weather conditions soon disrupted the fleet with many retirements taking place. All the student division yachts retired as did the Division 2 yachts after battling heavy conditions.



CLUB PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Commodore Bruce Davidson and the Executive now set about to develop the Mecka

site. Much planning and construction was started with the large hole in the center of the area having to be filled. Don Fuller, Lew Taylor, John Kelly and others took on the task of filling and leveling the site.

Finally the area was fenced and water and power

connected. The development continued over the next few years. Bill Bremner and Rod Schlencker carried out the much-needed engineering and survey work during the development time.

The Lease was finally signed on the 17/12/85. New equipment was arriving slowly when the Club could afford it and, thanks to John Kelly, new dinghy trolleys saved members having to carry them to and from the water.

With the new larger area, boat storage was no longer a problem and the yard saw many new boats make use of the dry storage area.

At this time Life Membership was bestowed on foundation Commodore Harry Parker in recognition

of his tireless efforts and support of the Club.

The Club became an Incorporated Body in the 04/04/85, thanks to the dedicated work by John Learmonth. The By Laws were set in place by the end of this year.

As time went on the Department of Harbours and Marine required a site at Rosslyn Bay for the Department of Fisheries.

A proposal was put to the CCYC to consider the relinquishment of their developed site back

to the Department in exchange for a cash reimbursement to the value of \$89,000. A Special General meeting of the Club was held at the FMBC on 12/4/1988 and the motion put for the relinquish of part of the land was lost.


A further notice of motion that the Club should reconsider was put at the quarterly Meeting on the 10/10/88, at this meeting it was agreed to relinquish the said land back to the Department.

Much discussion followed on this proposal and as the lease fees had risen alarmingly the

then Commodore Rob Hodgetts, Vice Commodore John Harry and the Executive negotiated with the Department and on the 12/6/89 the exchange finally took place.

Use of the Club ramp and hard stand was still made available for Club members.

Now the club was without a home. This proved very trying over this period of time, so an



agreement was made with the Coastguard to share their facilities on payment of membership fees. CCYC Members were then able to use the Coastguard facilities.

The Coast Guard erected in 1976. Bob Domotor, Flotilla Commander.




Fowler. Heat 7 "Brass Monkey" competitors sailing of



A flare & liferaft demonstration was held at the Club in September in conjunction with the Coastguard and other aspects of safety at sea were displayed.


These meetings were informative and members gained first hand knowledge on the

An AYF Training Scheme run by TAFE was well under way in 1989. Many CCYC members attended the courses.


QYA also were prominent in visits and courses were arranged and held.

Mystery and Bar B O cruises to the islands were held in the early months of 89. Many motor vessels and yachts joined together for island socializing.



CLUB PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

As time went on it soon became imperative that a clubhouse must be established. So the Works

Committee at the time consisting of Barry Laundry, **David Parker and** John Harry. traveled to Goonvella and purchased two demountable buildings these were transported and positioned on site by

- 12/12/90.

They were then

reconstructed. Electricity, water and phone were connected, a verandah was added and painting was carried out by Club members at working bees. The sewerage was connected by the end of 1991 and the Club House, as it is today, was finally in place by 1991.

The official opening of the new facility was held at a formal function on 27/06/92. The opened was performed by club Patron Frank Champion and Commodore Red Fixter. Frank 's speech is recorded further on.

Now members were having concerns when using the old ramp so quotes and plans were obtained by John Harry to construct a new ramp on the site of the old Mecka ramp, which had been pulled back to form the basis of the new ramp. This construction started on 10th August with the help of a large number of Club members and was completed by September 1991.



Owing to an increase in numbers and usage of the Club's facilities, the Committee began to up-date the By Laws of the Club and these were published for all members in July Dogwatch. These were then updated from time to time when deemed necessary.

An electric gate(which improved security), new dinghy racks & a gold phone for

members use were installed. A new flag pole was made and erected by Red Fixter A 3 door bar fridge, (making life so much easier for the bar attendants) arrived.

New indoor furniture was supplied by the **Social Committee.** The Club was granted a full Club **Liquor License on** 09/09/93.

Red Fixter's request to obtain a new start/finish craft was answered with the purchase, to the delight of the Sailing Committee, of the "Deirdre P".

A sad farewell was bid to Basil Fixter (our first Caretaker) in his passing on the 29/6/92. As John Learmonth wrote in the Dogwatch of that month "We were all fond of Bas with his warm friendly charm and willingness to help everyone. He was a fine example of a gentleman both in every day life and in adversity".

The K.B.S.C. made a formal approach to the Club re the construction of a 3 bay boat shed and this was accepted and finished in late 1993, when the shed with the CCYC & KBSC boats were installed.

Improvements to the Club continued over the next few years and at the Quarterly General meeting on 01/02/95 Bruce Davidson moved a motion that the Club now look at construction of the Pontoon, which was put on hold ever so long

At this same meeting David Parker submitted the plans and cost for a new kitchen for the Clubhouse, and, thanks to club painters, plumbers, electricians, welders and general helpers, this was completed by 25/3/95

Now to the large pontoon project. Piles were driven and dredging started in July and construction completed was on 14/12/96. David Parker constructed the walkway with help from his crewmembers, and Bruce Ross completed the land based boardwalk area in February 1997. Thanks must go to a number of dedicated Club members for their help on this major project. The boardwalk and pontoon put a finishing touch which was beyond the dreams of the Executive that so

long ago put forward the plans to construct and beautify the area.

Other major projects were completed. The extension to the boat shed (with a residence set up for the Caretaker) a new office together with a new winch which had been planned since 1983.



They took out 3rd place in the Cruising division while the Mackay yacht Waterline sailed by Don Brooks, won the racing Division.

harbour with "We're Simply the Best" blaring across the water. J. H's "Allegro" reply was to return to the harbour with" "We Save the Best to Last" A record fleet of 32 vachts entered the fun "3 Islands" Race and in light. increasing to 20 knots, northerly

winds "Rampage" blitzed the fleet even though starting last off the blocks. May be the runners helped!!!

"Starship" skippered by Robert Carter came in the winner in the Cruising Division.

Many of the ladies in the Club were interested in learning to sail and Rosemary Attwell made her yacht available for sailing instructions. These were held over the next few weeks in October.

Race Organization and Officer-of-the-Day Courses were held at the Club and a good attendance was had. Pattie Burgess held First Aid courses which saw many members rolling and applying bandages to various parts of

other member's bodies.

The 1992 "4RO Round the Bay" Race will be remembered by many. A fleet of 23 entered but with bad weather looming, some withdrew early.

Bevan Proposch's M/V "Blue Gum" started the race in a brisk northerly and with a steady 10 knots, building to 25knots

as they neared the finish at Sea Hill a massive bank of black clouds approached from the mainland. The winds changed from the north to a 40knot southerly as the storm approached. Fast Lane was making heavy weather of it and withdrew behind Peak Island. After this event Phil McKone's nickname was changed from "Fair Weather Phil" to"Foul Weather Phil. "Rampage" crossed the line

"Rampage" crossed the line as Blue Gum withdrew into Pacific Creek. However

"Rampage's" spinnaker jammed and for the next thirty minutes in the middle of the storm she had a frantic ride. Fortunately sea room was available and she managed to weather the storm. "Restless" finished and made it into Pacific Creek while "Pabati 111" was left, after the storm tore across the Bay, in failing airs of 2-3 knots and crossed the line at 10.30pm. She was last in, but 3rd overall.

Starting in February 1993 the Inaugural Central Queensland Yachting Championships came into being. These were a joint

venture between the PCSC and CCYC. They consisted of three weekends of yacht racing, comprising two heats in Gladstone, the Gladstone to Rosslyn Bay Race and two heats on

This consisted of *Race 1*(Wed), Island race, (Thursday)Lay Day (with all the crews playing golf at Capricorn Resort) *Race 2* (Friday) buoy race with briefing and farewell dinner in the evening. Finally *Race 3*. (Saturday) Yeppoon to Mackay Race.

"Rampage" sailed by David Parker and crew won the overall event and took out the Mackay race for 1993. "Eve's Delight" (Max Cridland)from M.Y.C 2nd, "Seaulater" P.C.S.C. 3rd, "Pabatti 111" (John Newton) 4th, and "Fenina" (Bill Fraser) 5th. "Allegro" (John Harry) took out the **Multihull Division** while"Impetuous"(Vince O'Brien) won the Scintilla Cup for the third year in succession. **Capricorn International Resort sponsored this event** which was called **The Keppel Ocean Racing** Series and was to stay for the next few years.

Patron, Frank Champion, made available his yacht "Kooltandra" to be Radio Relay vessel this year and followed the fleet to Mackay.

The annual 'Darwin to Ambon' Yacht Race on the 31/7/93 was



held with 72 yachts competing. This saw the CCYC flag aloft on our Club multihull "Allegro" (with John Harry skipper, Geoff Farr navigator and other members of the

CCYC as crew) start and sail to victory in their division.

Peter Clayton with "Kielee" had competed in this event in 1988 and 1990, Peter's enthusiasm for this International race had sparked off the adventure for other members to follow.

March 1994 saw OOD training sessions held at the Club with many interested members taking part, on and off the water.

Mackay race week again saw many entrants and 20 yachts lined up for the start. "Restless" (Ray Hobbs from P.C.S.C) won from Peter Macdonald in "El Buraq", "Rampage" (David Parker) 3rd, with "Casper"

(Wayne Hoey) winning the Scintilla Cup.

Saturday1st April saw the introduction of the "April Fools Race" which was sailed toViv. & Joy Barnes place in Coorooman Creek.

This fun event proved very popular and an overnight stop allowed other members who did not sail to drive down and join in the festivities at the "Landing". **Extract here from** Dogwatch: "The estuary negotiated, the sail home was delightful. One short shower washed away the last of the mud from the toenails and after a few tacks, one long reach from Wedge Island brought us to Rosslyn Bay". "Banyandah" (Kevin Luck) took line honours and was followed home by "Parledee 11" (Richard Watson) with "Rhoma" (John Graham) third.

This year only one race was held in the lead up to the 1995 Yeppoon to Mackay Race This was the Invitation race held on the 27th and won by "Capricorn Magic" (Reg Harris). The weather proved strong and on the

morning of the Mackay Race the strong wind warning was cancelled at 8am. just prior to the start.

As Commodore John Harry said in his Report in the June *Dogwatch*:

'This year's Yeppoon to Mackay race was an incident filled weekend and one which we all hope will never be repeated'.

The race started in moderate conditions but as the fleet drew further out to sea conditions worsened and saw many of the fleet retire to the protection of Port Clinton and Island Head.

"Rampage" was leading "Bit O'Fluff" and "Restless", with all yachts recording fast

speeds. As "Rampage" was rounding High Peak Island a large rogue wave heeled her over and the next wave capsized her. All six crew were in the water. "Bit O'Fluff" saw the incident and turned to assist but was unable to help. "Restless" came on the scene and within 40 minutes saw all of the Rampage crew on board and resumed the race to Mackay.

Earlier to this "El Buraq" had retired from the race and was

proceeding to shelter. Nearing Port Clinton she was hit by a large wave and all crew were

thrown into the water. Three were able to regain the yacht but Peter Macdonald, Maureen and Robert Carter were left in the water and, in the heavy conditions, were in great peril.

Sadly Peter Macdonald did not survive. Maureen and Robert were able to make the shore. The club was deeply saddened by this loss and the next year a

Memorial race was set up to honor and remember our Member.





Patron and foundation member Frank Champion addressed the gathering and went on to officially open the facility.

With an unscheduled speech, Past Commodore and foundation member Bruce Davidson called on the Secretary to christen the Club Boat the "Deirdre P". Assisted by John Harry and a bottle of champagne, she preformed this duty. The hot food and varied drinks kept out the cold and a most enjoyable evening was had by all.

Patron, Frank Champion's speech on the occasion of the Club opening follows.

This is a very happy landmark in the history of the Club, and I would like to thank the Committee for inviting me to participate in the formal part of the evening. Despite the apprehension of the founding committee, there is no doubt the CCYC has filled an important gap in the yachting activities of Central Queensland.

This is evidenced by the increase in membership and boat registrations. Over the years it has been interesting to observe the interests of people attracted by and catered for by the Club. At one end of the scale we have straight out racing or cruising members, more often they combine these pleasures. At the other end of the scale are the dreamers and those who enjoy the fellowship, also people who love working on or building boats. Some lucky people seem to span all these categories. During its short history, we have been fortunate to have a large number of people who have served unselfishly in various ways and have been responsible for the running and advancement of this Club. At times some very significant decisions and changes of direction were undertaken, not I might add, without very considerable thought and anxiety. On behalf of all members, I would like to thank all that have contributed in this way.

I don't wish to single out particular people, as I would be here all night, however I would be remiss if I did not mention the services of Deirdre Parker and John Learmonth. They have served the club for 14 years in the position of secretary and treasurer respectively, and without whom the administration of the Club would have been particularly difficult. As you know, most of the Club meetings for convenience have tended to be held at one of the committee member's home, with the open meetings held on neutral ground.

In the beginning, the open meetings were held in my waiting room of my old surgery Bolsover Street, however after a short period of time the FMBC kindly offered us the use of their Clubhouse, which was then situated opposite the Bulletin building. As it was more convenient for most members, we continued to use the venue for many years, even after the lease of the land at Rosslyn Bay.

After the acquisition of this land, rockblock amenities building with an open area at the front and ramp was built. This was done using voluntary labour, mainly due to the efforts of Don Fuller who contributed over many years. During the mid. to late eighties, the Club ran into a severe financial storm, brought about among other things by the heavy rental demanded by the Government. The helmsmen of the Club during this time proved to be very good financial heavy weather sailors, and in true Illingworth style shortened sail early with the relinquishing of that portion of the lease which contained the Clubhouse. This resulted not only in a marked reduction of the rent but also a significant injection of cash into the Club coffers which put the finances on a sound basis and made subsequent developments possible. Most members don't realise the huge amount of work and worry by people involved at this time. On behalf of us all, I would like to thank all concerned

Once again we were out in the cold with a yard but no clubhouse. This time the Coastguard took pity on us and we were very grateful for the use of their clubrooms until the present clubhouse was finished. We now have a clubhouse which is very practical and of which we can be very proud.

The vision, organization and implementation of this project was carried out by a number of people but the driving forces were undoubtedly David Parker and John Harry. To all involved in this project, the rest of us say a very big thank you. After all the trials and tribulations the Club has now a sound base on which to build. Given the type of people concerned with their friendship, enthusiasm and hard work, I feel the Club will go from strength to strength and serve the region over years to come.

On behalf of all Club members, I have much pleasure in declaring the joint facility, the ramp and Clubhouse, officially open.






